THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Kaya, Wanju Hello and Welcome

Despite ongoing challenges from COVID-19 through the early part of the year, including delays brought on by closed borders, quarantine rules and shifting capacity limits, 2022 proved to be a successful showcase year of international, national and local artists of excellence.

Our exhibition program commenced in Bunuru season with work by criticallyacclaimed British filmmaker and installation artist Sir Isaac Julien. Spread across three galleries, the exhibition was developed in an ambitious partnership with SAMSTAG Museum of Art and the 2022 Perth and Adelaide Festivals. Julien's installations, produced on movie-scale budgets and multi-location film shoots, are highly sought after internationally and we were privileged to bring two of his seminal works to Perth audiences.

In the Brodie-Hall Atrium we celebrated the powerful pictorial critiques of Badima (Yamatji) First Nations artist Julie Dowling, highlighting the existence and legacy of enslaving Aboriginal people in Australia. We also staged *Energaia*, an exhibition of multi-disciplinary work from visual artists, filmmakers, designers and writers engaging with low carbon energy futures, which included the monumental work on paper, *1:1 Wind Turbine Blade* by Susanna Castleden.

As the Western Australian borders re-opened and travel restrictions relaxed somewhat, we moved into Djeran season with confidence, opening *Lindy Lee: Moon in a Dew Drop* by Australian Chinese Artist Lindy Lee. Curated by former MCA Director Elizabeth Ann Macgregor OBE supported by Associate Curator Megan Robson, the exhibition was a welcome other-worldly, zen-like experience of stillness and calm in nature.

Our ongoing collaboration with the Curtin Writers group resulted in a beautiful publication *Where the Ink Falls,* an anthology of writing responding to Lee's artworks.

We also presented *Soft/Hard: radical love by R. Goo,* which offered an insight into the personal and political struggles for LGBTQIA+ liberation, through a curated collection of more than 40 artworks from the Curtin University Art Collection, many of which had never been seen before.

Kambarang season highlighted the best of Western Australia's visual art practice with the annual John Stringer Prize and a wonderful selection of recent acquisitions carefully curated by JCG Collection Manager. Curator Lia McKnight.

On display at JCG, *Carrolup coolingah wirn* has continued to enrich and develop understanding of The Herbert Mayer Collection of Carrolup Artwork and the children of the Stolen Generations at the centre of the story. The JCG team are extremely proud of the Carrolup collection, which provides outreach opportunities for truthtelling and community engagement. In conjunction, JCG was also able to develop and tour the exhibition *Tracing the art of a Stolen Generation: the child artists of Carrolup* to the UK. Featuring some artworks from the Herbert Mayer Collection, the tour aimed to bring the children's story to overseas audiences and potentially uncover lost artworks in the process.

2022 also marked the completion of major new public artworks at Curtin's Exchange precinct, including works by esteemed Australian artists Janet Laurence and Warren Langley.

On a personal note, I would like to extend a huge thank you to all our donors, partners, collaborators and friends who have supported us throughout the year. While 2022 was another challenging year for the arts and education sector, it was a more positive and fruitful year with the realisation of long-planned projects and an outstanding exhibition program featuring a diversity of inspiring artists. Finally, to the JCG team, who have endured the uncertainty of the pandemic in their personal and professional lives, I extend my gratitude. Thank you for never losing sight of the Gallery's vision to make tomorrow better through the power of art.



CARROLUP

Staffing and management

Michelle Broun's contract as the Curator Australian First Nations Aboriginal Art has now ended. Kathleen Toomath continues as Carrolup Manager until October 2023.

Recruitment for additional staff supported by a new Lotterywest grant commenced in the latter quarter of 2022 with new staff taking up positions in February 2023.

Programming

The *Carrolup coolingah wirn: The spirit of Carrolup children* exhibition, was opened to the public throughout the whole year, and visitors found the experience moving, informative and beautiful. In addition we also installed *Bidya Gurlbarl (Open Secret)*, an exhibition of portraits by internationally acclaimed Badimia/Yamatji First Nations artist Julie Dowling, in February/March.

The Child Artists of Carrolup: Tracing the Art of a Stolen Generation (part of the UK/AUS Season of Culture) exhibition was staged at the Portico Library, in Manchester from 8 July – 26 September and at the Hunterian Museum and Art Gallery Chapel, University of Glasgow from 5 October – 11 November. Both exhibitions were incredibly well received and featured opening events and an engaging public program. Extensive media coverage resulted in the location of one of the previously unseen Carrolup artworks.

Fundraising and partnerships

Funding from our 3-year BHP agreement continues to provide the bulk of resources for Carrolup. Funding for the UK Tour was secured from Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) and the British Council with matched funding from Dept of Local Government Sport and Cultural Industries. Lotterywest funding was secured for 2 years of programming support and for the fitout of 139 St Georges Tce as a City Portal.

Fundraising continues for the permanent home for the Carrolup Centre for Truth-telling . Strategic partnerships continue to develop with public agencies which hold collections of Carrolup artworks such as State Library of WA, Berndt Museum of Anthropology at UWA, Shire of Katanning, Fremantle Prison.





FACULTY COLLABORATIONS

Curtin Autism Research Group – our relationship with CARG continued with the Digital Arts for Life project, a collaboration with DADAA and Art Gallery of WA, funded by WA Education Department, delivering art workshops to teenagers with Autism.

They also collaborated on a publication *Where the Ink Falls* in response to the Lindy Lee exhibition.


