THE YEAR IN REVIEW

In 2023 as we celebrated the Gallery's 25th year, we underwent significant changes and re-positioning to better place the Gallery on a firm footing for the future.

We began the year in a new position within the University structure following the disbanding of the Corporate Relations Directorate with the retirement of Vice President, Val Raubenheimer. The Gallery now sits within the Vice-Chancellery, reporting to the Chief Advancement Officer. The other major change include the retirement of Gallery Director Chris Malcolm mid-year.

The Gallery's Vision and Strategic Directions have been aligned with the new Curtin Strategic Plan 2023, which focusses on three Goals: People, Planet, and Partnerships.

In 2023, the Gallery delivered an excellent exhibition program with a return to four seasons, and with support from our external partners BHP, Lotterywest, Perth Festival and Wesfarmers Arts, and Lendlease, and visitor numbers have rebounded.

The highlight of the program for me was the delivery of the highly anticipated second iteration of the Regional Arts Triennial, Open Borders, and the opportunity to work with so many talented and inspiring regional arts practitioners.

Lotterywest and Gilbert and Tobin's support enabled the employment of three new staff members and the introduction of regular education and engagement programs under the umbrella of the Carrolup Centre for Truthtelling.

Since the establishment of the Carrolup Centre in 2020 the work of the Gallery in this space has expanded considerably and whilst The Herbert Mayer Collection of Carrolup Artwork continues to lie at the heart of what we do, there is now a much-expanded collection, significant engagement programs, and two major capital works programs sitting under this umbrella.

We loaned 12 facsimile artworks from the Carrolup Collection to the Sydney Biennale to appear in a curated exhibition at the Chau Chak Wing Museum, University of Sydney, between February and June 2024. Two works from the University Art Collection were included in the Exhibition "State of Abstraction" at the Art Gallery of Western Australia.

Interim Director Jane King presented three papers at the International University Museums and Collections Conference held in August at University of Sydney, Chau Chak Wing Museum. Several JCG staff attended the AMAGA National Conference in Newcastle earlier in the year and facilitated a group presentation on the Digital Arts for Life project undertaken in 2022 in partnership with DADAA, AGWA, and the Faculty of Allied Health.

The 2024 Exhibition Program has been released with a full calendar of exceptional exhibitions across four major seasons. Highlights include the second iteration of the Indian Ocean Craft Triennial – IOTA 24, and a touring exhibition from AGNSW Brett Whiteley: Inside the Studio.


